SUBJECT: FIRST QUARTER SUSPENSION/EXPULSION REPORT 2006-2007

ASD Goal: Establish and maintain a supportive and effective learning environment by providing safe, caring, barrier-free schools.

PERTINENT FACTS:

Information regarding suspensions and expulsions for various offenses, including weapons, is collected from the elementary, middle, and high schools each quarter. The information is shown in the narrative information below and as Attachments A-F. Suspension/expulsion information is also reported from the charter schools

First Quarter Expulsion

Twenty-five students, including four middle school students and twenty-one high school students, were expelled by the School Board during the first quarter of the 2005-2006 school year; no elementary students were expelled. This is the same number of students expelled during the first quarter of 2004-2005. One middle school student was expelled for a weapon violation (BB gun) and three students were expelled for fighting/assault. High school expulsions included drugs/alcohol (7), vandalism (2), assault (3), criminal acts (2), false alarm (1), fighting (2), weapons other than firearms (2), firearms (1), threats/instigating (1).

Discipline Reports

The elementary, middle, and high school discipline summaries follow: elementary first quarter by school and category (Attachment A & B); middle school first quarter by school and category (Attachment C & D); and high school first quarter by school and category (Attachment E & F).

Elementary Schools

As compared to the 2005-2006 school year, elementary suspensions increased during the first quarter of the 2006-2007. There were 162 recorded suspensions in

2005-2006 and 215 in 2006-2007. There were five weapons violations (one small pocketknife, one package opener, one pellet gun, one air gun and brass knuckles), which resulted in suspension during the first quarter; there were two reported weapons incidents during the first quarter of 2005-2006. There were no expulsions or findings of causality for the first quarter of the 2006-2007 school year.

There were zero drug and alcohol suspensions for the first quarter compared to four during the first quarter last year. There have been eight sexual harassment suspensions compared to two last year. The largest areas of increases were seen in fighting which increased by 35 suspensions, assault which increased by nine suspensions, and general disruptive behavior which increased by six suspensions.

Ten of the elementary schools had zero suspensions both in 2005/2006 and 2006/2007, while 25 schools had one-three suspensions in both years. When comparing the number of suspensions in 2006/2007 to 2005/2006, 11 schools increased suspensions over the first quarter of last year by one-two, while 15 schools increased suspensions by three or more. Nineteen schools had a decrease in the number of suspensions from the first quarter of last year, while 17 schools had the same number of suspensions in first quarter of 2006/2007 as 2005/2006.

Middle Schools

The number of students suspended during first quarter of the 2006-2007 school year for grade six, (Mirror Lake only), seven and eight was 319. There were 291 suspensions during first quarter in 2005-2006. This is an increase of 28 suspensions compared to the same period in 2005-2006.

First quarter suspensions for harassment/bullying showed a significant decrease from 31 to 16. The sexual harassment category also decreased from six to four suspensions.

Other suspension categories remained relatively constant or showed minor increases across the Division. Suspensions for fighting increased from 82 to 88. Drug suspensions increased from three to six and alcohol suspensions increased from zero to two.

All middle schools are taking proactive steps to reduce aggressive/bullying behaviors. These steps include:

- 1) Implementation of the Aggressors, Victims and Bystanders (AVB) Programs.

- 2) Early intervention referrals to Prevention and Intervention Coordinators (previously called Drug and Alcohol Reduction Coordinators) in all Middle Schools.
- 3) Collaboration with School Resource Officers (SROs).

The effectiveness of these programs can be seen in the suspensions rates for middle schools. Even though the Division's overall suspension rate reflected minor increases, it is evident that middle schools are implementing alternative methods to promote positive student behavior.

Polaris K-12

Polaris K-12 had seven suspensions during the first quarter of 2006-2007, five for reckless and unsafe behavior, and two for profanity/obscenity. Polaris K-12 had no expulsions for the first quarter of 2006-2007.

High Schools

The number of high school suspensions for the first quarter of the 2006-2007 school year is 662, a increase of 87 suspensions compared to the first quarter of last year when there were 575 suspensions.

There were 80 fighting incidents the first quarter of 2006-2007, compared to 77 fighting incidents during the first quarter of the 2005-2006. There were 39 incidents of threats during the first quarter of the 2006-2007 school year, compared to 19 incidents of threats during the first quarter of 2005-2006 school year.

For the first quarter of the 2006-2007 school year, there were 45 drug-related suspensions and 23 alcohol-related suspensions compared to 52 drug-related suspensions and 16 alcohol-related suspensions in the first quarter of 2005-2006 school year.
