SUBJECT: SECOND QUARTER SUSPENSION/WEAPONS/EXPULSION
REPORT: 2003-2004

PERTINENT FACTS:

Information regarding suspensions and expulsions for various offenses, including weapons, is collected from the elementary, middle, and high schools each quarter. The information is shown in the narrative information below and in Attachments A-F.

Second Quarter Suspensions

Total second quarter suspensions for the 2003-2004 school year decreased in the elementary schools (from 231 last year to 191 this year) and middle schools (from 797 last year to 733 this year). Total second quarter suspensions at the high school level increased slightly (from 803 last year to 816 this year).

Elementary schools showed decreases in fighting/assault (102 to 93), sexual harassment (8 to 3), and willful disobedience (18 to 11), while incidents of harassment were up (5 to 19). There were no firearm incidents in the elementary schools during second quarter. Every category in middle schools showed decreases except weapons (9 to 10) and tobacco (2 to 11). Suspensions at the high school level showed significant decreases for fighting/threats (120 to 87), drug/alcohol (122 to 80), harassment (17 to 8), and smoking (12 to 3); however, suspensions were up slightly in other areas.

Second Quarter Expulsions

Eight middle school students and 44 high school students were expelled by the School Board during the second quarter of the 2003-2004 school year. No elementary students were expelled during this time. The 52 students expelled during second quarter this year compare with 53 students expelled during the same period last year. Action by the School Board is pending for three middle school students and nine high school students who are accused of violations during the second quarter.

Discipline Reports

The elementary, middle, and high school discipline summaries follow. These show elementary schools second quarter by school and category (Attachments A & B), middle schools second quarter by school and category (Attachments C & D), and high schools second quarter by school and category (Attachments E & F).

In Discipline Reports (attachments B, D and F), "other" is the final category choice for recording offenses. At times, this descriptor has been used when a more definitive category would have been preferred. Instructional division leaders have committed to working with schools to restrict the use of the "other" category to times when none of the 13-19 specific labels are suitable.

The second use of an "other" category has been in the quarterly suspension and expulsion memorandum where highlighted offenses that are tracked over a three-year period do not explain a significant portion of the suspension statistics. In this memorandum and successive reports, this category titled "other" will be followed by narrative summarizing these pertinent suspension areas.

Elementary Schools

There were forty fewer elementary suspensions during the second quarter of the 2003-2004 school year than in the second quarter of the 2002-2003 school year; down from 231 suspensions in 2002-2003 to 191 in 2003-2004. There were four weapons violations (a toy gun, a shocker pen, a leatherman and a carved wooden shank) that resulted in suspension during the second quarter; there were four reported weapons incidents during the second quarter of 2002-2003.

There were three drug and alcohol suspensions for the second quarter compared to two during second quarter last year. There were two gang-related incidents to report during the second quarter of 2003-2004; there was one in 2002-2003. There was one racially motivated offense reported for the second quarter this year, four were reported in 2002-2003.

There were no expulsions or findings of causality for the second quarter of the 2003-2004 school year.

Among incidents listed in the "other" category are: profanity/obscenity (9), theft/robbery (5), vandalism/pranks (2), dangerous actions (7), false alarm/bomb threat (2), disruptive behavior/disobedience (12), general disruptive behavior (11), false information/cheating (1), bus misconduct (1), fireworks/explosives (1), threats/instigating (3), inappropriate sexual behavior (1) and reckless/unsafe behavior (18), other (4).

Middle Schools

The suspension rate for the second quarter of the 2003-2004 school year for grade 6, (Mirror Lake only), 7 and 8 was 733. There were 797 suspensions during the same period in 2002-2003 and 666 in 2001-2002. Decreases occurred in the following categories: 26 in fighting/assault, 11 in harassment, and 11 in drug/alcohol. Suspensions in the "other" category include 76 for profanity/obscenity, 38 for general disruptive behavior, and 65 for dangerous actions or materials, and behavior.

Middle school suspensions continue to be below the numbers of the previous years. This is attributed to the special effort made by each middle school team to integrate harassment and violence prevention training into their curriculum.

**Second Quarter Expulsion/Suspension Report
Polaris K-12 School**

There were three suspensions at Polaris K-12 School during the second quarter of the 2003-2004 school year. This represents a decrease of sixteen suspensions as compared to the same quarter last year. Of the three suspensions, one was for threats, one for reckless and unsafe behavior and one for false information/cheating.

There were no expulsions from Polaris K-12 School for the second quarter of 2003-2004.

High Schools

The number of high school suspensions for the second quarter of the 2003-2004 school year is 816, up from 803 suspensions during second quarter last year.

This is the first year that fighting/threats and drugs/alcohol have been reported as separate categories. Total suspensions in those categories showed significant decreases this year compared to last year.

The Other category includes infractions such as Profanity/Obscenity (68); General Disruptive Behavior (86); Dangerous Actions/Materials (20); Theft/Robbery (12); Truancy (22); Excessive Tardies (18); Accessory to an Act (2); Arson/Fire (5); Failure to Identify Self (9); False Witness/Lying (42); Vandalism (6); Suspension until Parent Conference (4); and Refused Option to Suspension (207). Additional categories included in the Other category are: False Alarm (2); Bus Misconduct (13); Disruptive Items (1); Forgery or False Impersonation (8); Fireworks/Explosives (2); Inappropriate Sexual Behavior (1); Prohibited Organizations/Groups (3); Reckless Unsafe Behavior (6); Criminal Acts (4); Trespass (4); Gambling (2); Misuse of Internet, E-mail (1).

Repeat offenses would not necessarily be in the same category. A student who has been suspended on a first drug/alcohol violation, for instance, may later be suspended for a different infraction and be listed as a repeater.

Charter Schools

There were no suspensions or expulsions during the second quarter of 2003-2004 at Frontier or Aquarian Charter Schools. Village Charter School had one drug/alcohol suspension and no expulsions. Highland Tech High had 23 suspensions and two expulsions (one firearm and one drug/alcohol (Attachment G)). Highland also had one student who was suspended with conditions, rather than expelled, due to causality.

Family Partnership Charter School reported two expulsions; one for gang related behavior and one for a firearm.
