Notes From the Nurse

Important Message for Parents of Children with Asthma

If your child has an inhaler for asthma, please be advised that he/she may carry an inhaler at school if written permission is obtained from you and your child's physician. Please contact your school nurse or your child's physician for more information.

Is it a cold or an allergy?

Break up is near and the Spring allergy season is not far behind. Soon I will be seeing students in my office with sneezing, sniffing, and congestion which they believe are symptoms of a cold when in fact it may be seasonal allergies.

Nasal allergies can be either seasonal (pollens, grasses, trees, weeds) or perennial, which occur year round (dust mites, mold spores, cockroaches, or pet dander.) Children are more likely to suffer from allergies if one or both of their parents have allergies or they are exposed to irritants such as cigarette smoke at an early age.

So if you or someone in your family has recurring or persistent cold-like symptoms and you aren't sure what's causing them, check this list and discuss the results with your doctor.

You may have a cold or sinusitis if:

- You have a fever.
- You feel generally achy.
- Your mucus is not clear.
- You have a headache or feel pressure in your sinuses.

You may have an allergy if:

- Your eyes, ears, nose, throat (especially the palate or roof of the mouth) feel itchy
- Sneezes occur in rapid, multiple sequences
- Mucus secretions are clear and runny
- You develop dark circles under the eyes &/or a line or crease across the bridge of the nose which did not exist before
- Your symptoms occur around the same time or each year
- Your symptoms get worse when pollen counts increase
- Allergy symptoms tend to last longer than the typical seven to ten day duration of a cold.

PROM

Saturday, April 2nd is Prom. Each year we meet with the Juniors and Seniors to cover our expectations at Prom. Some of the information that we discuss includes the following:

- Dress Code will be enforced.
- Limos and "Fun Buses" will be searched.
- A first time suspension for drugs/alcohol results in a 10-day suspension; however, if the student attends a drug/alcohol class, the student's suspension will be amended to 5-days.
- A second time suspension for drugs/alcohol will result in a recommendation for expulsion. This also means that the student will not be allowed to participate in graduation.

We want our students to have a fun and safe time at our Prom. Please find time to talk with your kids about making safe choices!

TARDIES

The ERHS tardy policy is in place to promote an uninterrupted learning environment and favorable work habits. Students are issued detentions for being tardy to class. A student is tardy when the bell rings and they are not in their assigned class. A student is considered absent if more than 15 min. late. The Student Services Assistant Principal will determine whether any tardy or detention in question is beyond the control of the student.

- Students must serve detention within two days of the tardy date.
- 1-4 Tardies=serve a lunch detention or after school work detail. Lunch detentions are from 10:35-11am daily in Mr. Parker's room, D107. After school work details are from 2:10—3:00pm, and students check into the Front Office to report.
- 5th Tardy=referral to Student Services which may result in the assignment of a Saturday School, to be served from 9 a.m.—12 noon the following Saturday.
- 6th Tardy=referral to Student Services which may result in a suspension.
- Unserviced detentions may result in a Saturday School.
- Unserviced Saturday Schools may result in a 3 day suspension.

Scheduling for Next Year (see dates above) – Counselors will be making classroom presentations to freshmen and sophomore English classes regarding student schedules for next year. Students will be given a packet of information including a transcript and credit check. Counselors will help students start to fill out their course selection sheet and will ask that the forms be taken home and signed by a parent. Sophomores will then be called down individually to review their selections, while freshmen will be asked to return their signed form to their teacher. Information will be e-mailed to parents prior to the classroom presentations. Please contact the counseling office with any questions.

Accuplacer Test – Attention Parents of Juniors and Seniors! – Is your student considering attending UAA? If so, they need to take the Accuplacer test! The Accuplacer is a test that determines a student’s placement into college math and English classes. The purpose of this is to help Juniors plan for their Senior year by seeing where they stand with regards to college placement. The cost is \$15.00 and can be taken at the UAA University Center or here at the Eagle River campus by calling 786-7612 to schedule the test. The Accuplacer test will also be given at ERHS on March 24th after school in the Arctic Lab. Sign-up in the counseling office.

HSGQE/SBA Tests – On April 5, 6, and 7--all freshmen will be taking the SBA test and all sophomores will be taking the HSGQE test in reading, writing, and math. In addition, all juniors and seniors who have not passed a section of the test will also be testing. On Thursday, March 31st (the week prior), all sophomores will be taking the SBA science test. On April 6th - 8th only students who are testing have to come to school in the morning. There will be a 2nd bus run three hours later for those who have already passed. Friday will be a normal school day with everyone attending. Sophomores will be pulled from their morning classes to test on April 1st . Please contact the counseling office if you have any questions.

Multicultural Education Concerns Advisory Committee

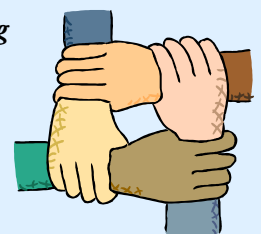
More than half of ASD's student population is made up of culturally diverse students.

The only thing better than winning a trophy is winning lots of trophies, which is exactly what ERHS's AFJROTC drill teams did at the State meet, hosted at Service High School over the President's Day weekend. Each of the five competing teams placed in the top three, with First Year Color Guard earning third place, First Year Regulation and Armed Regulation taking second, while Regulation Color Guard and Regulation Drill teams stole the show with first-place trophies. This was a bittersweet end to the drill season, as cadets said goodbye to Senior Airman Sergio Cruz. Airman Cruz has coached the armed regulation team through two drill seasons and has helped cadets with exhibition armed drill. Many long goodbyes were had as cadets exchanged parting gifts and Airman Cruz recognized the seniors for their dedication to the Armed Regulation team.

Approximately 20 cadets from Eagle River, accompanied by instructors and other AFJROTC cadets from West High, spent a cozy winter night at Otter Lake on February 25th. These cadets participated in winter survival, an annual eight-mile hike from Camp Carrol out to the lake where cadets build snow shelters and learn how to survive in winter conditions. Alaska Performance Scholarship

An invitation to excellence, extended to students, parents and educators alike.



Fact Sheet – Jan 2011

WHO can get the Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS)?

Alaska residents who graduate from an Alaska high school (public, private, or home school), in 2011, and:

- complete a rigorous high school curriculum, as defined by regulations
- achieve a high school GPA of at least 2.5, or equivalent
- earn a minimum score on college or career readiness test (21 on the ACT, 1450 on the SAT, or 5 on WorkKeys)
- enroll at least half time, and remain in good standing, in an approved program at a qualifying Alaska institution
- have qualifying education costs remaining after using all other non-loan aid (e.g. federal grants or other scholarships)

WHERE can the APS be used?

At any regionally accredited college or university in Alaska, or for approved career and technical education programs.

HOW MUCH is the APS?

There are three maximum annual award levels: up to \$4,755, \$3,566, and \$2,378. Amounts are established based on a combination of minimum GPA and test scores. Students may remain eligible for up to eight semesters of enrollment, but must use the award within six years of their high school graduation year.

Funds can be used for qualifying costs of attendance certified by the postsecondary institution, which typically include tuition, fees, books, tools and supplies, room and board and transportation. Students must apply for and use any other non-loan financial aid to pay their education costs first. They will not receive more APS funds than the costs of attendance that remain after other aid is considered.

WHAT is required to get the APS?

Step 1) TAKE A RIGOROUS HIGH SCHOOL CURRICULUM (see chart on reverse)

Step 2) MEET THE GPA AND TEST SCORE REQUIREMENTS WHILE STILL IN HIGH SCHOOL (see chart on reverse)

Step 3) APPLY

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after January 1, 2011, and before June 30, 2011. Students applying to a school that is not FAFSA-eligible may use an alternate application available from ACPE.

After an initial award, students can continue to be eligible for up to a total of eight semesters by:

- filing a new FAFSA or approved alternate application by the deadline each year
- making satisfactory academic progress as set out in regulations (including number of credits earned and college GPA, if applicable)
- staying enrolled at least half time in a qualifying program of study

WHEN will the APS be available?

Once the legislature appropriates funds, the high school graduating class of 2011 will be the first students eligible for the APS. Governor Parnell's proposed FY 2012 budget includes a request for \$8.2 million for the 2011 awards.

Alaska Performance Scholarship Student Eligibility Criteria

The Alaska Performance Scholarship is available to Alaska residents who graduate from an Alaska high school (public, private, or home school), in or after 2011, who:

1. Complete a rigorous high school curriculum; and
2. Achieve required grade point averages (GPA); and
3. Achieve minimum college or career readiness test scores; and
4. Attend an eligible program at an institution located in Alaska.

Important: Minimum curriculum requirements are set by year of graduation.

¹ Students electing the Math and Science Option may substitute a unit of foreign language, Alaska Native language, or American Sign Language, fine arts, or cultural heritage for one of the 4 units of social studies.

² For the purposes of APS eligibility American Sign, Alaska Native and foreign languages are all considered world languages.

Procedure For Adding an ACT or SAT Score Not Reported to District

The only way the Anchorage School District receives ACT or SAT scores to post electronically to a student record is if the student lists a valid high school code on the registration form at the time of registration. If the student leaves it blank or fills in one that is invalid—ASD will not receive the scores in the data file to post.

If a student has done this and wants to use a score for eligibility consideration for the Alaska Performance Scholarship, they must do the following:

ACT

- Student completes the 2010-2011 ACT Additional Score Report (ASR) Request Form and provides the information in the section that says, "Complete this section to request a report to a high school or uncoded institution/agency/ or a personal copy. They can also submit it online or by phone at 1-319-337-1313.
- A fee is charged for the report and payment must be by valid credit card.
- When the student receives the report—they leave it sealed and hand deliver it to the Assessment and Evaluation Department at the ASD Ed Center, 5530 E. Northern Lights Blvd.
- A&E will not accept an unsealed score report.
- A&E will enter the scores into the ASD Student Information System and they will become part of the student's test history so they can be used for eligibility for the Alaska Performance Scholarship.
- A&E must receive the sealed reports no later than May 4, 2011.
- A&E will mail the score report to the student once it has been entered into the system.

SAT

- The student calls SAT directly at 1-866-756-7346.
- They request that a paper score report be mailed to their home address.
- A fee is charged if the student already received a personal copy from the original registration.
- When the student receives the report—they leave it sealed and hand deliver it to the Assessment and Evaluation Department at the ASD Ed Center, 5530 E. Northern Lights Blvd.
- A&E will not accept an unsealed score report.
- A&E will enter the scores into the ASD Student Information System and the scores will become part of the student's test history so they can be used for eligibility for the Alaska Performance Scholarship.
- A&E must receive the sealed reports no later than May 4, 2011.
- A&E will mail the score report to the student once it has been entered into the system.

- **Online**—Submit requests for regular or priority reports via our website through your ACT Web account. See types of reports and fees below. Payment must be by valid credit card.

Once you submit a request by any method, it cannot be changed or cancelled. Scores are not given to anyone by phone, fax, or e-mail.

Note: Reports you request will include the SSN or ACT ID now on your record. Changes can be made to records for test dates after September 1, 2008 (not archived records) only if you provide one of the following directions below:

- ASR requests are processed after your tests has been scored and are available for reporting. Using an ASR service does not expedite the scoring of your tests.
- Use valid ACT codes only. See list on www.actstudent.org. If the college has more than one campus, you must indicate by city and state the campus to which you wish your scores sent.
- Processing will be delayed if you do not provide your Social Security number or ACT ID from your score report and test date (month and year), if you want to send scores from a month during which you tested more than once, SPECIFY the TEST LOCATION or the TYPE of test to report (e.g., National, International, and State).
- We will send your report to the office designated by the institution to receive all ACT scores, not to any other individual or office.

DELIVERY TYPES

REGULAR REPORT is a complete report and is normally processed within one week of receipt of your request. These reports are delivered in the next cycle requested by the college or agency, at least every two weeks.

PRIORITY REPORT is normally processed within two working days after receipt of your request, and is usually delivered 3 to 4 business days later.

Priority reports are available only for institutions in the United States and include only your identifying information and scores. 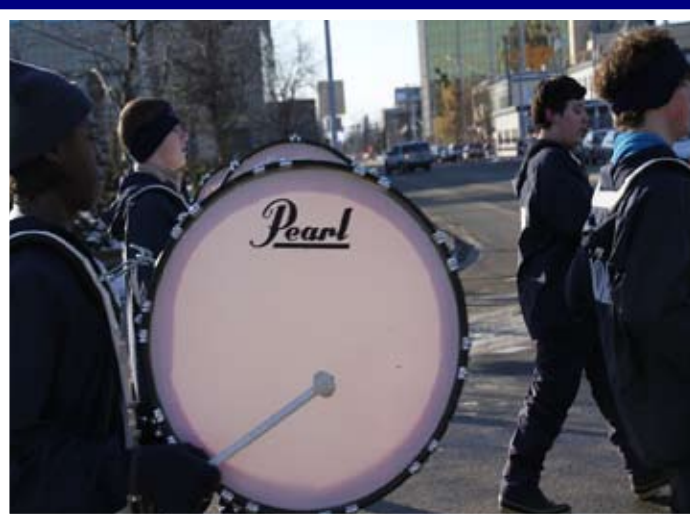
