
#### Bob's Intensive Course Description Spring 2022

## **Introduction to Analog Game Design**

#### Grade Level: 7-12

This course is an introductory look into the process of creating analog games of all sorts. Focus will be on the concepts games need to be successful. Different genres of games will be studied to showcase how the concepts have been applied. Ultimately, students will apply the design concepts to make their own game. The emphasis of the class is tabletop gaming, <u>not</u> digital gaming. However, the concepts will still be applicable. **Credit Count: Elective Class Fee: \$0.00 = FREE!** 

#### Catapults with Joe Fish



In this class we will be examining the design and use of siege engines. The class will start with a study of the purpose behind siege warfare and the various examples seen throughout the history of warfare. We will be examining the fortifications designed to defend and their various designs. We will additionally be studying the design of the weapons and implements designed to defeat those fortifications.

This class will include guided research on the various designs of siege engines. Participants will share their research with classmates.

The class will culminate in the design, building, and testing of our own catapults.

### Ken's Biking Intensive-Spring '22 Road Biking elective Grades 9-12 and **7-8 by instructor choice** only

We'll spend the first couple of days learning the basics of bike safety, maintenance, and sizing as well as take a look at some of the latest technology available. The rest of the intensive will be devoted to biking trails in the Anchorage Municipality (Eklutna to Girdwood). We'll try to vary the trails by difficulty and scenic opportunities and we will adjust our rides based upon the comfort level of class participants. Participants will need a well-maintained and fitted bike. **This is not a class for BMXer's**. Busses will be provided for the Indian to Girdwood ride and the Eklutna Lake ride.

The only funds required for this class should be spent on yourself for bike maintenance, food, beverages, and a helmet.

You are required to be in class every day. Missing one day is equivalent to missing one week of a quarter-length class. While missing for doctor appointments or other commitments is appropriate, if you cannot commit to this, then please find another class.

**Safety is of primary importance when biking.** Properly fitted helmets are required for this class. No one is allowed to be on their bikes without one. Riding helmetless is reason for withdrawal/failure from the class. In addition, no headphones of any type are allowed on our trips, nor are phones. Riders need access to all their senses while riding if they are to ride safely. I will have a phone to contact emergency services or Steller if needed.




## **Creature Creation:**

Introduction to sculptural arts to bring imaginary creatures to life.

Come and learn the basics of sculpture through creating creatures. You will learn the basics of how to go from a sketch to a full creature. The skills we will be practicing include the following:

- **1.** Basic sculptural techniques and assemblage.
- 2. Introduction to sculpture using oil clays, epoxy clays.
- 3. Basic needle felting techniques.
- 4. Character design.
- 5. sculptural painting techniques.
- 6. Armature building.

This course will cost \$60 and count as an elective art credit.

## Travel to Somewhere to Hike, Camp, and Backpack



I am waiting to see if the district will allow us to travel out of state. If they do, I will be taking students to the Southwest of the United States. We will be flying into Las Vegas and then driving to national and state parks to camp and hike. Locations include Zion, Bryce, and the Grand Canyon National Park. We also will stay in Page, Arizona and do a three day backpacking trip in Arizona. We will be camping each night, except for the first night in Vegas. Most meals are included in the price, unless we get the opportunity to go out. Students will need camping and backpacking gear.

OR

If the district does not approve out of state travel, we will do a Southeast Alaska trip. We will fly into Ketchikan and spend time camping, hiking, and backpacking for the first week. Then we will take the ferry to Juneau and camp and hike in that area.

If all else fails, we will head out from Anchorage down the the Kenai Peninsula to backpack out of Seward and then head to Homer. The cost for this trip would be less than \$1200.

In each location, we will be hiking, camping, and backpacking, so students will need camping gear, a backpack, and will need to commit to being in relative decent shape.

FYI: Southeast Alaska is wet and raining during this time of year, so plan on bringing good raingear, rubber boots, and a good attitude.
