What is a problem statement?

Adapted from an <u>article by Alan Bryman in</u> the *International Journal of Social Research Methodology*: A problem is a statement about an area of concern, <u>a condition to be improved upon</u>, a difficulty to be eliminated, or a troubling question that exists in <u>theory</u> or in <u>practice</u> that points to the need for meaningful understanding and deliberate investigation.



Elements of a problem statement

Key elements of an effective problem statement include:

- Gap: Identify the gap (pain) that exists today.
- Timeframe, location and trend: Describe when and where the problem was first observed and what kind of trend it is following.
- Impact: Quantify the gap (cost, time, quality, environmental, personal, etc.)
- Importance: To the organization, the individual, etc. to better understand the urgency.


