# Thanksgiving Blessing

Thanksgiving Blessing puts faith into action and brings together people of good will for a common goal: *to provide a Thanksgiving meal for families who might otherwise go without.* 

Thanksgiving Blessing began in Anchorage in 2004 when the faith community came together to talk about how Thanksgiving meals and food baskets were distributed in the city. They discovered that distribution was scattered and limited. During the holidays Food Bank of Alaska received hundreds of calls from people who were chasing food baskets around town. Each church had different requirements and different hours. Sometimes churches ran out of food.

The planners agreed that the ideal way to make best use of the food for the most people in need was to establish a date and time for our neighbors to get groceries for a holiday meal at accessible locations organized by residents' zip codes.

In that first year, 2004, the project provided more than 1,700 families with a turkey dinner and all the fixings. Altogether 8,384 Anchorage families received a Thanksgiving dinner last year. Congregations and volunteer groups gather food – often rising to the challenge of collecting 500 cans of vegetables or 1,000 packages of stuffing – to help one of the six distribution sites. Cash donations are also very much needed to fill in gaps in what's collected.

### Food Bank of Alaska secures a turkey for every family in need and depends on financial donations to do this.

Thanksgiving Blessing happens every year because of the churches, temples, social service agencies, and volunteers who bring together this ambitious endeavor on behalf of our neighbors.

In 2018, Thanksgiving Blessing provided meals for more than 7,000 Anchorage families

- Statewide, 103,000 Alaskans, or 1 in 7, are sometimes without the food they need.
- 56% of our hungry neighbors also have unpaid medical bills.
- 60% of households seeking food help have at least one household member employed within the last year.
