Sound Your Barbaric Yawp! Exploration of Poetry

Teacher: Joe Seitz Credit: .25 credit language arts elective Grades: 8-12 Fee: \$5.00

In this intensive we will be concerned with *experiencing* poetry. We will focus less on what poetry "means" than what it does. What needs and desires does poetry fulfill in its writers and readers? When does it leave the static page and become something performed, ritually memorized, communally celebrated, or otherwise brought to life?



Break it Make It Teacher: Mindi Vogel Credit: .25 credit art elective Grades: 7-12 Fee: \$30 + one to three found objects

In this intensive we will deconstruct found objects and then use parts of or the entire deconstructed object to assemble new sculptures. This art elective will help you acquire skills in using elements of design, i.e., space, line, shape, form, color, and texture. We will also learn 3-Dimensional design fundamentals, construction techniques, and artistry. This intensive is all about critical thinking, creativity, and hands-on learning.

Over summer break, collect one to three found objects to deconstruct. LOOK AROUND – walk down the street, stroll across a park or a vacant lot, stop by a garage sale. Look for discarded objects from nature and/or the man-made world.

Coastal Ecology

Teachers: Bryan Smith & Christian Haich Credit: .25 credit science elective Grades: 8-12: 7th graders with instructor permission Fee: \$500; \$250 by May 3, \$250 when school starts in August

Are you ready for an AMAZING experience across the bay from Homer? We start our first week in the forests of the Campbell Creek drainage, looking at how the forest is responding to the spruce bark beetle infestation and learning to identify and remove invasive tree species. Then we'll head south as we take our ecology intensive on the road. Be delighted as we explore the beautiful coastline of Alaska and all she has to offer as we pass through Peterson, China Poot, Kasitsna, and Jakalof Bays. This area suffered a bark beetle infestation about 20 years ago that dramatically reorganized the forest ecosystem we'll walk through. Revel in the tantalizing tastes of fresh blueberries and learn to identify other edible, medicinal, and poisonous native plants as we meander through nature. Take a moment to enjoy the native plant and animal life both onshore and off, leisurely sketch the wilderness around you, and explore the rocky coastlines at low tide. Plus - spend a week with Bryan and Christian...what could be better?



Fly Fishing Fun

Teacher: Jess Winn Credit: .25 credit PE Grades: 7-12 Fee: \$150.00

Spend a week learning the finer skills behind fly fishing. We will have a week in town practicing our skills, then take off and head to camp in Kenai for a week and fish on the river. Some knowledge of fishing is recommended as well as having a pair of chest waders and shades. We look forward to catching fish for dinner and who knows what else! (Under 18 no fishing license is needed - 18 and over valid license is needed).



Humanities of the Ancient World

Humanities of the Ancient World will focus upon the ancient civilizations of Greece & Rome. In this intensive, we will learn the tools of the historian, using primary sources and archaeological evidence to explore these two amazing civilizations. This class will be good for both the beginner who is interested in a background knowledge of history and the advanced student who is looking for a more in depth understanding of Greece & Rome.

This intensive will focus on the Western genre of fiction, including literature, film and television. We will discuss the role of the Western genre in America's identity and history and how the messages and themes of the Western has changed and evolved over the years. We will also discuss the myths surrounding Westerns and what the reality was like. Students will also be producing a short film or novel in the Western style.

Making Musical Instruments

Teacher: Kelly Hebert Credit: .25 credit art elective Grades: 9-12 Fee: \$75.00

There are some things people always do, in every culture, throughout history, and for no good reason. One of them is to create; to make new things or decorate things that already exist. Another is to groove



sound, that is, to make or enjoy music. This intensive explores the overlap between these two universal human activities. Students will be expected to use hand tools and be comfortable with measuring in either metric or customary units. Some guiding questions: What are commonly accepted musical instruments in our culture? What makes a thing a musical instrument? How do we differentiate between sound, noise, and music? How do you play this thing? Can we jam? Where are the earplugs?
