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Dear NLABC Families,

RWB assemblies will be on April 8th. Intermediate students will be recognized at 8:30am and our primary students will be recognized at 9:30am.

Here are the elective descriptions based on the 2021-2022 ASD Middle School Program of Studies Handbook.

Service Learning- This is a community and school project-oriented elective designed to integrate learning experiences from the general school curriculum. The purpose is to make learning and education experiences more immediately relevant and meaningful to learners as well as increase good citizenship for all students.

Study Skills- This elective is designed to supplement and enrich all areas of the student's regular program. Time is provided to focus on needed skills with individual and small group assistance.

Debate- Students explore multiple perspectives and research and defend a variety of positions and issues while developing strong reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills. The study and practice of academic debate will strengthen various language arts and civic skills, including: argument construction, evidence analysis and evaluation, organization, outlining, persuasion, effective word choice, citation, research competence, media literacy, reading comprehension, summarization and outlining, public speaking, ethics and civility.

Outdoor Adventure- This course will cover different outdoor activities both in the classroom and through hands-on experience. A variety of activities will be covered, as well as the exploration of the gear needed to participate in them. Students will read from a variety of outdoor literature and biographies of important individuals and engage in different projects.

Personal Finance (Economics)- Students build a foundation of financial literacy through hands-on studies of personal finance and principles of economics. Activities such as experimental economics, mini-society, Junior Achievement, and/or the stock market game will provide opportunity for fun exploration of important 21st century topics.






At Home COVID-19 Health Screening for Parents and Guardians

Ask these questions at home before sending students to school. Anyone who answers "yes" to questions #1 or #2 must not enter the school or participate in a school sport or activity. Students do not need to stay home if they've answered "yes" to question #3. See guidance below.

Within the last 5 days, have you been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a positive test for the virus?



- Fever (defined as a temperature 100.4F or higher)
- Chills
- New trouble breathing or shortness of breath
- New cough
- Diarrhea
- Abdominal pain
- Vomiting

- Fatigue
- Joint pain
- Muscle aches or body aches
- New rash
- Loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Headache
- · New congestion
- New runny nose

Do you live in the same household or have you had close contact in the last 5 days with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19?

Close contact counts if you have been within 6 feet for more than 15 minutes (cumulative over 24 hrs), or if someone from public health contacted you to let you know you are a contact.

Note: If a child or staff member lives with someone else who was named as a contact, it is okay for the child or staff member to go to school. We do not quarantine contacts of contacts.

STAY HOME or go home immediately if the answer is YES to one or more questions above.

Parents / guardians should follow the Return to School Options pathway (see reverse) to determine when to send students back to school. **DO NOT** send student to school with any of the above symptoms. 4 Are y

Are you vaccinated?

5-day quarantine is recommended but not required. CDC recommends a molecular-based test on day 5 of initial exposure. This is not required by ASD. CDC recommends masking in public and monitoring symptoms for 10 days from last day of exposure.

Return to School Options

For Anyone with COVID-19 Symptoms or a Positive COVID-19 Test Result:



If you test positive, stay home for 5 days after your first symptom or positive test, whichever is earlier. After 5 days, you may return to school when you have not had a fever in 24 hours without fever reducing medicine, as long as your other symptoms are improving.



If you test negative, you may return to school once you have not had a fever in 24 hours without fever reducing medicine as long as your other symptoms are improving.



If you do not get a test, stay home for 5 days. You may return after 5 days if you have not had a fever in 24 hours without fever reducing medicine as long as your other symptoms are improving.



If your healthcare provider determines your symptoms are from something else, you may return to school with a note from your provider as long as you have not had a fever In 24 hours without fever reducing medicine and your other symptoms are improving.



NO CELL PHONES IN SCHOOL ZONES FACTSHEET*



A new ordinance (law) passed by the Anchorage Assembly on June 20, 2019 makes it unlawful for a driver of any vehicle to talk on a mobile communication device while driving a vehicle within an active school zone or on school grounds, unless the vehicle is stopped or a hands-free device is used.

1 PURPOSE OF THE LAW

- Student safety is extremely important.
- Distracted driving is dangerous.
- Talking on a cell phone or mobile communication device is distracted driving and jeopardizes student safety in designated school zones.



2 TERMS USED IN THE NEW LAW

A mobile communication device is a cellular phone, smart phone, personal data assistant, wireless tablet, computer, or any similar device used for voice or visual communication.

An active school zone is a school zone with signage between 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. and where the maximum speed is 25 miles per hour or less on the streets permanently or due to a temporary speed reduction indicated by flashing school zone lights.

A hands-free device is a phone with speaker capability, an attachment, or other piece of equipment that allows the use of the device without either of the operator's hands.

3 THERE ARE SOME EXCEPTIONS IN THE LAW

- A vehicle is stopped OR a mobile communication device is used with a hands-free device.
- A mobile communication device is **used to dial 911** and make an emergency call.
- An operator of an **authorized emergency vehicle** is using a mobile communication device while acting in an official capacity.

4 CONSEQUENCES FOR VIOLATIONS

- A \$500 fine, or
- A class A misdemeanor if a person's driving causes physical injury or death to another person.

5 QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Why isn't talking on cell phones banned while driving everywhere in Alaska?
 The State of Alaska has preempted Anchorage's right to ban talking on a cell phone while driving, but reading or typing a text message while driving is prohibited statewide.
- Can I call my student when I'm there to pick them up? Yes, if your car is stopped, then you can call your student on your cell phone. Or, you may call your student on a hands-free device.



- Do these rules apply only when the school zone lights are flashing? No! Most schools don't have flashing lights. These rules apply in an active school zone, where the speed limit is 25 mph or less, even if temporarily indicated by the flashing lights, and is designated by the signs posted that say "School Zone". If the speed limit is never reduced to 25 mph or less, the street is not in an active school zone and the rules don't apply even if there are signs.
- How can I be sure if I am in a place where I can legally use my cell phone? If you are unsure, don't use your cell phone! Pull over, stop, and use your cell phone when you are not driving.
