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A Reading Challenge

By reading more complex books, your child can learn new words, facts, and ideas. The exposure to more complicated plots can help a reader grow. Here are some suggestions to try:

- Knowing something about the topic or setting makes a tougher book easier to comprehend. If your child is reading a novel set in France, ask someone you know who has been there or look up the country online (try a children's site like kids.nationalgeographic.com)
- Encourage your child to look at a simpler book on the same subject. A picture-book biography about Harriet Tubman may help your student better understand a textbook chapter on the civil rights movement, for instance
- Suggest that your child read complicated material with a pencil and paper in hand.
 Jotting down questions, words to look up, or facts they want to learn more about.


