

Teachers and Administrators Input Opportunities...

Staff, students, parents, and community members have the opportunity to provide input on teacher and administrator performance. The input forms are shared with the person's immediate supervisor. Forms are available now until April 28.

Please share the following ways to provide input with school families, students, and staff:

The web-based input forms are confidential and will be transmitted electronically by Human Resources to the appropriate supervisor. Printed copies are also confidential and routed to Human Resources and then to the immediate supervisor. Schools will also keep the forms confidential and route them to Human Resources.

National Junior Honor Society

What is the National Junior Honor Society?

NJHS is a middle school student organization with the purpose of promoting the values of scholarship, service, leadership, character, and citizenship within a school.

How do I become a member of NJHS?

Each Quarter 3 an application will be given to those that meet the academic requirements. The candidate will complete the application, essay, and teacher's recommendation form and turn them into Mrs. Swisher.

Membership

Selection for membership is by a faculty review of applicants and is based on outstanding scholarship, citizenship, character, leadership, and service. Once selected, members have the responsibility to continue to demonstrate these qualities. Members who resign or are dismissed are no longer eligible for membership or its benefits and they may not reapply for membership. Once selected, members will be expected to attend meetings and participate in NJHS service projects, activities, and fundraisers. **Selection of Members:**

- 1. To be eligible for membership, the candidate must be a sixth-grader OR a seventh-grader at Clark Middle School.
- 2. The selection of members to the chapter shall be by a majority vote of the faculty council.
- 3. All faculty members will review the applicants' names. Students who do not promote service, leadership, citizenship, and character in the classroom will not be considered for membership.

Scholarship Requirements:

All applicants must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better as their overall score for each core class on the report card from the first two quarters.

Service Requirements:

All applicants are required to have documented and verified community service hours.

Leadership and Character Requirements:

Students will be asked to detail their leadership experiences while attending Clark Middle School or any other middle school they have attended.

Essay:

All applicants will be required to submit one essay, discussing how they meet the pillars of NJHS.

Letter of Recommendation:

Students are required to include a letter of recommendation from 2-3 adults who can speak to the pillars of character, leadership, citizenship, and service.

- Step 2 Call your son/daughter's counselor to clarify concerns.
- Step 3 Request a progress report if appropriate
- Step 4 Request a conference with teachers to include counselor and student.
- Step 5 Keep your son/daughter involved throughout the conference
- Step 6 Follow up with recommendations to assist student and monitor progress at school

Cell Phone Policy

Cell phone use during the school day has become a serious classroom distraction and has increased tardies during passing periods. To keep the focus on learning, and distractions to a minimum, cell phones must be turned off as soon as you enter the school until the end of the school day. Cell phones may **not be used during passing periods.**

We understand that families enjoy the convenience of communicating important family news by cell phones. However, because conversations infringe on the teacher



- > Cell phones must be out of sight and sound upon entering the building. This includes all passing periods.
- > A student must politely turn the cell phone off and relinquish it when asked by a staff member.
- Camera phones are **not** to be used on campus as they threaten privacy (locker rooms and bathrooms), and can promote cheating (pictures of exam).
- Phones that have been confiscated by an administrator, due to misuse or inappropriate actions can be picked up by a parent/guardian.

From p. III-2 Middle School Student Handbook:

7. Cell Phones/Electronic Communication Devices

Conditions of Use:

A student may possess a cellular telephone or other electronic communication device (ECD) (e.g. paging device/beepers, personal digital assistants, and other devices designed to receive and send electronic signal) in school.... as long as such activity does not interfere with the educational processes or safety/security. As a condition of this permission, the student assumes all risk of loss,



damage or theft of the cellular phone or other ECD.

.... Elementary and middle school students (grades K-8) are permitted to use cellular phones and other ECDs only before and after school. Cellular telephones and other ECDs must remain off and put away at all other times during the school day.

Type with your voice!

Dictation turns your Google Chrome into a speech recognition app designed to assist with written expression. You can use Google Chrome as a voice recognition app and type long documents, emails, and school essays without touching the keyboard. Dictation uses



Chrome's local storage to automatically save the transcriptions, so you will never lose your work. There is no need to continuously press the "Save" button. Internally, it uses the Web Speech API of Chrome that is supported in all the newer releases of Chrome browser including Google Chrome on Android. The app is integrated with Dropbox and Google Drive to help you easily export the transcribed text to your various online accounts. Alternatively, you can send the dictated text to any email address.

Happy New Year Clark scholars! Let's bring in the New Year with excellence! This month in Language Arts, we are continuing Unit 2 *Power of Change*. Students will be learning more about change in a more holistic framework while learning challenging literacy terms. To assess students' performance, students are expected to write an informative literacy response to the story Walk Two Moons. In writing, students will be formulating Argumentative Essays justifying claims with evidence and logical arguments while incorporating the following terms (*logos*, pathos, and ethos) in their writing. They also will be developing an educated claim and argument as well as connecting arguments to real-life matters. In Science, students will be moving from energy flow in the ecosystem to energy in general. Students will be exploring the differences between kinetic and potential energy, then move into renewable and non-renewable energy sources. 

Ms. Parchman ELA/Writing:

Students have been exploring how to create/write a great argumentative essay: using rhetorical techniques like Logo, Pathos, and Ethos. They have also been utilizing grammar and writing techniques to help make their sentences grammatically correct. Lastly, students will create a 3-4 minute speech (using their argument essays) and present this to the class. We have explored how to address the 'counterclaim' and add this to our essays with the best evidence to 'knock out,' the counterclaim.

We will start Unit 3 for Springboard in February. Unit three is the "Challenge to Make a Difference." Students will be completing a multimedia campaign on a topic of their choosing (that effects all of us) and then present a presentation regarding this topic and offer solutions to combat some of these important issues.

Language Arts:


