### 2019 PEAKS State Assessment – Reach New PEAKS of Learning!

Each spring, Alaskan students are provided an opportunity to show what they know. When students show what they know, teachers and parents can partner to promote student success.

The Performance Evaluation for Alaska's Schools (PEAKS) is Alaska's summative assessment administered to students in Grades 3-9 (English language arts and mathematics) and grades 4, 8 and 10 (science) each spring. The purpose of a large-scale, summative assessment is to provide parents and schools an overall picture of a student's progress in meeting the Alaska standards at his/her grade level. The assessment is taken on the computer and is not timed, but each content area takes approximately 100-180 minutes.

Parents can locate resources for the PEAKS assessment, including directions for PEAKS Practice tests, called Online Tools Training and PEAKS Tutorials on the ASD website at www.asdk12.org/PEAKS.

Parents can also help by ensuring their children are well rested, eat a nutritious breakfast, and are at school on time for the days of testing. Please avoid scheduling appointments on your child's testing days.

## **Parent Cafes**



Our school has begun having Parent Cafes as a way for parents to connect and support each other while building a strong school community.

A café is held in a room with five tables. Each of the five tables has a host with four to five other people. The host asks questions and the group has a discussion about them. After 15 minutes the group disperses to different tables with a host who has different questions. After another 15 minutes the group disperses to a third table for a final discussion.

#### The discussions follow Parent Café Agreements:

- 1. Speak from your own experience: Use "I" statements
- 2. Listen attentively: Do not interrupt
- 3. No judgements, positive or negative.
- 4. Do not give advice.
- 5. Confidentiality: what is talked about at Parent Café stays at Parent Café.
- 6. Turn off or silence cell phone.

The conversations are centered around 5 research based protective factors the keep families strong. The five factors are as follows:

Resilience-as parents, in order to deal with the stresses of life, we need to be strong and flexible and be able to bounce back when adversity hits. By creating a welcoming atmosphere and opportunities for supportive relationships it gives encouragement and strategies to parents.

Relationships-when caregivers have positive trusted friends in their community a support system for needs is established. Together we work out ways to handle issues that arise. It's important that we get to know each other so we are not alone in dealing with the challenges and celebrations of parenting.

Knowledge-Children don't come with instructions. Parenting is a continuous learning process and it is important to know child development and what are reasonable expectations. When our children are acting out we need to have good strategies for dealing with that.

Support-Everyone needs help sometimes and it is a sign of strength to ask for help when you need it. Often it takes a caring person in the community to help connect us to what we need.

Communication-Children need to know how to manage their emotions and express their needs. When children do this our job as parents and caregivers becomes less stressful. By listening to each other and understanding feelings, we provide for our parents what they do for their children every day.

The final Parent Café of the school year is this coming Wednesday, April 3rd at 5:30. Childcare is provided as well as a meal of baked potatoes with toppings. If you are interested in attending, please contact Ms. Angie at 742-8416 and tell her how many adults and children will attend.

Word of the Month: Cooperation: "I can work cooperatively with others."

#### Cooperation

Learning to cooperate means that a person can think about and balance their own needs and wants with another person's needs and wants. Many people think that cooperation means the child does what the adult wants.

That's not the case. True cooperation is a give and take between people that ends up with something they both agree on. When we cooperate, we have more positive social interactions and are better able to make and keep friends.

#### Qualities in someone who cooperates:

\*Strong communication skills \*Actively listens to others

\*Patience \*Ability to trust others

\*Good Judgement \*Ability to persuade others

\*Negotiation skills \*Ability to keep an open mind

\*Sense of humor \*Honesty

\*Good Manners \*Ability to support and motive others

<u>How we instill Cooperation</u>: Role-play how to cooperate. Role-playing can be a great way to teach cooperation because it allows parents to support their child's skill development, no matter how advanced or challenged. When your child has difficulty cooperating in a particular situation or with a particular peer, spend some time role-playing. Explain that other kids will want to keep playing with your child when he cooperates by doing things like taking turns, sharing, and working together. By providing your child with this supportive practice, you can help him develop new skills and be more successful at cooperating in the future.

#### **Activities for families:**

Use specific *praise to encourage children's efforts* to cooperate.

When parents pay attention to their child's cooperation skills, their child is more likely to use these skills again in the future. Parents can pay attention by using specific praise when their child cooperates. This might sound something like "Nice job taking turns and cooperating with your sister" or "I really appreciate how you are working together to finish this puzzle with your friends." Remember, your child's cooperation skills do not have to be perfect before you provide some praise. Cooperation is a complex skill, so praising children's efforts along the way toward mastery can keep them growing and developing.

Have kids work together to keep a balloon off the floor as long as possible by taking turns to tap the balloon with their hands, head, or feet. Not only is this game fun for children, it also provides you with lots of opportunities to model and praise cooperative efforts. It's a win for you and your children!
