Message from the Principal

Hello Scenic Park Families,

Welcome back! I hope you had a restful Spring Break. It's hard to believe we are in the final quarter of the year. As we begin the 4th Quarter, I want to focus attention on attendance and tardiness. Tardiness disrupts instruction for the late students and the rest of the class. Please be sure that your child is at school and on time. Students enter the building at 8:50 and need to be in their classroom, ready to learn by 9:00am. Students not in their classrooms by the 9:00am bell will be marked tardy.

Regular attendance is expected of all students. Students who attend school regularly are more likely to read at grade level, earn passing grades in middle school, and graduate high school. Students need to be at school on time and ready to learn every day. If a student misses 10 percent or more of school days for any reason (excused or unexcused), he/she is considered to be chronically absent. This amounts to about two days of school per month. Chronic absence can have a negative impact on the academic and social progress of the absent student. If you have any questions regarding attendance/tardiness, please don't hesitate to contact me.

Each spring, Alaskan students are provided an opportunity to show what they know. When students show what they know, teachers and parents can partner to promote student success. AK STAR, the Alaska System of Academic Readiness, is comprised of English language arts and mathematics. These tests are administered to students in grades 3-9. The Alaska Science Assessment is administered to students in grades 5, 8 and 10. The purpose of a large-scale, summative assessment is to provide parents and schools with an overall picture of a student's progress in meeting the Alaska standards at grade level. Parents can locate resources for AK STAR test and the Alaska Science Assessment, including directions for Student Readiness (Practice Tests and Tutorials), student testing times and general assessment information on the ASD website at <https://www.asdk12.org/akstar>. Parents can also help by ensuring their children are well rested, eat a nutritious breakfast, and are at school on time for the days of testing. The testing window will be conducted between March 27th and April 7th.



Message from the nurse:

This month's bulletin board theme is "Eat the Rainbow." Encouraging kids to eat fruits and veggies in all the colors of the rainbow. Eating healthy doesn't have to mean giving up your favorite foods. It simply means eating a variety of foods and cutting down on food and drinks high in fat and sugar such as sodas and sweets. Water is easy to overlook, but guidelines suggest drinking 6-8 cups of fluid a day. I encourage all students to bring their own water bottle to school every day. 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
News from our Health Teacher
