Dear Girdwood K-8 Families,

We welcome all returning and new students, as well as staff, and families to a new school year! The first month and a half of school has been exciting and it was great to see so many smiling faces at our Open House!

There are several new staff members joining the Girdwood K-8 team and staff we will miss as they transition into new adventures. We welcome back Sarah Rink, Sped TA. She comes back to us after spending a year at Kincaid Elementary in Anchorage. We welcome Jennifer Derks who is joining our team from Bayshore Elementary in Anchorage. Jennifer will be our second grade teacher. We welcome Joel Ribbens who is joining us from Wood River Elementary in Fairbanks. Joel will be our fifth grade teacher. We welcome Tammy Elyea who will be our new Sped pre-school and resource teacher. We welcome Alexander Antonio as our new school psychologist. Dawn Murphy will now be at a .7 FTE as she continues to be our health teacher and is now our behavior specialist. Our counselor position has changed to a .5 FTE behavior specialist position. Betsy Connell is one of our school's retired Sped teachers and is helping out as a Sped TA. Amy Stone is now our kindergarten TA, as well as our ELL tutor. Erin Henszey is one of our new kindy TAs as well. Leaving us are Erik Viste (promotion to elementary education director), Molly Hickox (promotion to assistant principal at Lake Hood), Laura Tufl-Gho (transfer to Mountain View), Alison Darosa (resignation), Selita Rios (resignation) and Ronda Barnes (resignation).

The 60 Minute Recess/Lunch Pilot Program has been positive and students are enjoying their extra time outside. We have noticed students have had more time to eat lunch and that students are bringing back home less in their lunchbox. I hope your child is excited about the extra recess and lunch too!

Just a few reminders about arrival in the morning and departure after school. School starts at 8:20 am and ends at 3:00 pm each day. Our school staff are not scheduled to arrive to school until 8:00 am. In the past we had arranged Open Gym for the students on the first bus when we were reduced to one morning bus. However, more and more students started coming to school earlier to participate in the fun with up to 50 students in the gym with one adult who couldn't safely supervise that many students. This is why we had to cancel open gym this year. We now have a teacher on the playground every morning with the duty of supervising students from the first bus. In case of inclement weather (pouring rain, wind and extreme low temperatures below -10 degrees F), we will let students inside the school. All students should come to school prepared for the weather. Unless your child is on the first bus or previous arrangements have been made with your child's teacher, please do not send or drop off your child before 8:20 am. Prior to 8:20 am, teachers are preparing for the school day and frequently attend meetings. Please prearrange before school visits with teachers, ensuring availability. Instruction starts promptly after the 8:30 am announcements. Students are dismissed at 3:00 pm and need to go directly to the bus, be picked up by a parent, or walk/ride their bike home. There is no supervision of students on the playground after school. Students are not permitted to remain on school grounds before or after the regular school day unless those students are directly involved in a supervised sanctioned school activity. MAP Growth is the ASD benchmark assessment for students in grades 3-9 in reading and mathematics. Grades 10-12 also take MAP Growth as part of Tier II and Tier III reading and mathematics courses.

MAP Growth is an online assessment tool used for instructional purposes. MAP Growth is an adaptive assessment that provides each student with a personalized testing experience with data that speaks to their individual progress and growth in mathematics and reading. Practice tests and accommodations are available. MAP Growth will be administered three times per year during the ASD Benchmark windows: fall, winter and spring. The benchmark windows for 2019-2020 are:

- Fall—September 3 September 20
- Winter—December 2 December 19
- Spring—April 20 May 8

MAP Growth practice tests are available to allow students the opportunity to become familiar with the types of questions and tools available on the actual MAP Grow assessments such as the highlighter and calculator. Practice tests are provided at <u>practice.mapnwea.org</u> and require login information (USERNAME: grow PASSWORD: grow) to access.



Outdoor Gear...Be Prepared!

With the ever changing weather, please make sure your child has a raincoat or winter gear, boots, and other outdoor clothing to keep them warm and dry during recess. We do go out if it's raining moderately and in winter we go out to 10 below with the wind chill.

ASD 60 Minute Lunch/Recess Wellness Initiative Pilot

Girdwood K-8, along with many other schools in the district, are part of a pilot program to increase activity in the schools. Students have 30 minutes outside at recess every day.Along with increasing the movement of students, we are providing more time for students to sit and eat with their peers. Students have 25 minutes to get their lunches and sit and eat with their friends. This is exciting and allows students time to eat and not feel rushed.By being a part of the pilot we will be collecting data during lunch, as well as recess, to see if it is beneficial to student learning.

Help Your Child Succeed in School: Build the Habit of Good Attendance Early

School success goes hand in hand with good attendance!

DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Find out what day school starts and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your child to her teachers and classmates before school starts to help her transition.
- Don't let your child stay home unless she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make her feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.



Parent Teacher Conference - Online Scheduling

The upcoming Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held October 23rd and October 24th. Conferences offer families the opportunity to find out how their child is getting along with classmates, how they're progressing in school, and what can be done at home to build upon strengths and overcome challenges.

Families should schedule conference times online. The Conference Scheduler will be available in early October for your to access. Scheduling early offers you the best opportunity to secure conference times that work best for your family, especially if you have multiple children. A notice will be sent out with the link when the Conference Scheduler opens. If you are unable to use the Conference Scheduler, please contact your child's classroom teacher to set up a conference. We are excited about this upcoming opportunity for teachers and families to discuss important information that will help students succeed.

ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuation) Drill

We are entering our fourth year of using ALICE procedures in the Anchorage School District. This year teachers will be teaching ALICE to their students by going over the acronym, covering why we do each part, answering simple questions, alleviating anxiety if necessary, and remembering the ALICE book is available in the library if additional materials are needed. We completed our first ALICE evacuation drill with students on 9/14 to our rally point and will complete three additional drills over the school year.

APD Hand Held Cell Phone in School Zones

As of June 20, 2019 handheld cell phone use is illegal in active school zones and/or upon school grounds. If you are caught violating this new ordinance, the fine is a big one: 6 points on your license and a \$500 fine. Here are the pertinent points to know regarding AMC 9.28.055(E)(1):

This law is in effect 6AM - 9PM seven days a week, 365 days a year.

This law applies to all signed school zones where the speed limit is 25 mph.

This law applies to all school zones where there are temporary speed reductions to 20 mph or less (the school zones with the yellow flashing lights).

This law does NOT apply to vehicles that are stopped (ex: parked in a school parking lot) or if the mobile device is being used hands-free.

If you are in violation of this ordinance, and you cause a collision that results in injury or death, the penalty for this ordinance becomes a misdemeanor.
