Outdoor Gear...Be Prepared!

Fall is upon us and our weather changes daily. Please make sure your child comes to school with the right gear: jacket, raincoat/pants, rain boots, gloves, and any other outdoor clothing they would need to keep them warm and dry during recess. All students have outdoor recess everyday except in cases of extreme inclement weather, so they need to be prepared. Older kids should be dressed for the weather, also. Please send your child to school with appropriate gear, regardless of what is happening outside when they leave in the morning. Thank you!

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Below are the basic guidelines for reporting a student's absence:

If your child will not be at school, please call the school office at 742-5300, or email Bethanie **and** Robyn, **before** 10:30 am, to excuse their absence. Please make sure you call the office, even if you have told their teacher.

If you know in advance of a scheduled absence, please call the office and send a note to the classroom teacher ASAP. This will help the teacher to gather schoolwork, if needed. If your child will be gone for more than a couple of days, please fill out the extended absence form. You can get one in the office.

Tardy students must stop in the office, sign in, and get a late pass, before going to class.

If parents want their child to ride a different bus home or get

If parents want their child to ride a different bus home or get off at a different bus stop, they must send a note for the bus driver and have it signed by the office.

Parents picking up students before the end of the school day must come to the office to sign them out. We will call them down from their classroom when the parent gets here.

NURSE NOTES

Welcome back to Girdwood school! We are so excited to see all your children back at school. We want to be a resource to all families for any health related concerns, please call (742-5301) or email nurse Raquel (Marrs Raquel@asdk12.org) on Mondays and nurse Summer (Stone Olivia@asdk12.org) on Tuesday through Friday.

We want to highlight the basics of what families need to know about <u>Covid</u> related communication, case tracking, and mitigation policies including symptoms to keep students home for, where to obtain testing and what to do with the results.

There has been a policy change due to confusion about letters being sent home regarding <u>Covid</u> cases at schools. We will now only send home letters to families that have had a case of <u>Covid-19</u> in their classroom. We will inform you if your student is considered a close contact and needs to quarantine or if they are not considered a close contact and do not need to quarantine.

If you would like to keep informed about how many active cases of Covid there are in Girdwood school you can check the ASD Covid-19 tracking page that shows active cases at each school and information about any school closures.

ASD is Symptom Free. Please screen your child daily and keep them home if they have:

- -Fever 100.4 F or higher, chills, or presumed fever (your child feels very warm)
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- -New Cough
- -Fatigue
- -Muscle or body aches
- -New loss of taste or smell
- -Headache
- -Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- -Nausea or vomiting, diarrhea
- -Skin lesions/rash
- -Exposure to someone with known COVID-19

If you need to keep your child home from school due to any of these symptoms they will need a molecular Covid-19 test prior to returning to school or will need to stay home for a 10 day quarantine period. Testing is available at the Girdwood Clinic and they are often able to get patients tested the same day with rapid results. Testing is also available at First Care Medical Centers on Huffman and they are also typically able to get patients tested the same day with rapid results. Other options include Anchorage Muni testing sites and ASD contracted Beacon testing at several school locations. These last two options typically take 2 to 3 days for results to become available.

If you have kept your student home due to a symptom they may return to school with a negative test result and symptoms resolving. If they have had an exposure to someone with <u>Covid</u> they can choose to quarantine for 10 days or test 6 to 7 days after exposure to return to school after an 8 day quarantine. We encourage everyone to test in order to best keep our community safe and school open! Thank you and we are here to support you!

Dear Parents,

Welcome back to another exciting challenge! Once again, we are offering the opportunity to participate in the Healthy Futures program through an Activity Log Challenge. During the challenge, students and schools are rewarded for being active. This school year, our goal is to increase the number of students participating, as well as increase the average number of logs per student. The fall challenge is September, October, and November.

The spring challenge is February, March, and April.

What is Healthy Futures? Founded by concerned parents, Healthy Futures is a statewide, grassroots movement to help youth build positive, lifelong physical fitness habits through two core programs: The Healthy Futures Activity Log Challenge and the promotion of youth attendance at local recreational events.

Why Healthy Futures? Kids are not as active as they should be. They need daily vigorous physical activity to build strength, endurance, healthy muscles and bones or they may face tough problems like obesity, diabetes, and lower self-esteem. At Girdwood School we are committed to helping students develop the skills, knowledge and desire they need in order to be physically active now and for the rest of their lives. Parents and the community also play a critical role in the solution for healthier, active children by providing motivation, encouragement and daily opportunities for recreation beyond the classroom.

How does your child participate in Healthy Futures? With your assistance, your child records physical activity on the Healthy Futures Activity Log.

Effective this school year, qualifying logs must show <u>at least 60 minutes</u> of physical activity during a day, for at least <u>15 days</u> of the month. Students can now count their active time during PE class and recess.

While it is healthiest for physical activity to be distributed throughout the month, the 15 days can occur in any pattern during the month and count toward a qualifying log.

The good news is that your child can spread out their 60 minutes of activity during the day. They can even break it up into smaller chunks of time during the day — as small as 10 minutes at a time of moderate to vigorous effort. For example, it could be 30 minutes of active time during PE class, 30 minutes during recess, and 20 minutes of playing tag with their friends after school. On a weekend, it could be a 60-minute hike with the family.

This helps children get closer to the national recommendation of 60 minutes of physical activity every day for the best health. Students turn in completed logs to me with a **parent signature** in exchange for exciting prizes!

THE PRIZES

Each month students who complete a log will receive an incentive.

September: Play Every Day buff/neck gaiter; October: Puzzle ball; November: Airplane Glider OR Football Rocket



At the end of the school year, I'll conduct a drawing for a grand prize. Students who complete more logs have a better chance of winning the grand prize! 3. The winner will choose form a menu of items:

Healthy Futures Champion hoodie, disc golf set, cornhole set, Spikeball set, and ladder ball.

PEAKS 2021 Student-Level Results

The Performance Evaluation for Alaska's Schools (PEAKS) is Alaska's summative assessment for students in grades 3-9 in English Language art and mathematics was administered in spring 2021. In addition, grades 5, 8 and 10 took science as a field-tested assessment. The science scores will not be reported at the student level or to the public. The purpose of a large-scale, summative assessment is to provide information to parents, educators, policy makers, communities and businesses about how Alaska's schools and districts are performing, along with an overall picture of an individual student's progress in meeting State of Alaska standards at his/her grade level.

At this time, districts and schools are beginning the score reporting process with the preliminary work of interpreting and understanding PEAKS results. The Anchorage School District is currently preparing our online student information system for parents to receive electronic PEAKS results on September 24th.

For both math and English language arts, each student will receive an overall score that is aligned to one of four achievement levels: Proficient, Advanced, Below-Proficient and Far-Below Proficient. Students performing at a scale score of 500 or more are Proficient. In addition, information on groups of standards, called reporting categories, will also be provided as part of the score reporting process.

English language arts (ELA) for grades 4-9 includes a Text-Dependent Analysis (TDA) score as one of the ELA Reporting Categories. The TDA is an item based on a passage or set of passages that a student reads during the ELA assessment. The TDA addresses both literary and informational texts. Students must draw on basic writing skills while inferring and synthesizing information from the passage in order to develop a comprehensive, holistic essay response. The TDA is hand-scored by the testing vendor using a rubric with a score range of 0-4, with a score of four being the highest. The rubric is available in the ASD PEAKS Parent Guide.

The Alaska Commissioner of Education, Dr. Michael Johnson shared the following as part of a letter to educators regarding interpretation of PEAKS 2021 scores (<u>Dr. Johnson DEED Commissioner PEAKS Letter to Educators</u>):

It is important to keep in mind that for many students, instruction and assessment looked very different during the COVID-19 pandemic. As local school boards managed the impacts of COVID, assessment participation rates among students taking the assessment were so low that the department cautions against drawing sweeping conclusions about student performance statewide. However, we can still glean helpful information by looking at performance at the school and individual student levels. Parents and educators can use individual student data from PEAKS and other local assessments to make effective instructional decisions during the 2021-2022 school year.

Please remember, PEAKS is not a pass/fail test. PEAKS is aligned to the Alaska State Standards and the scores provide information to guide decision-making and support students on their path to success. Alaska's standards and assessments ensure our students are academically ready to succeed in the community, jobs, career training, the military and college. The Anchorage School District maintains high learning expectations for all students and is committed to preparing students for success in life.

ASD Statement of Nondiscrimination

Board policy 114.1 Inappropriate Behavior

The Anchorage School District supports respectful learning and working environments and believes strongly this environment must be structured to reflect diverse cultural traditions and contributions. The District values diversity among students and staff and believes that all students and staff have the right to participate in school activities free from harassment. Behavior by Board members, administrators, employees, parents, volunteers, students, vendors, or others doing business with the District, that ridicules, harasses, intimidates, or threatens students, staff or community members, or otherwise undermines a respectful safe, and effective school environment, is prohibited. Individuals or groups are in violation of this policy if they engage in any of the above behaviors in a way that is disruptive to the work or education environment, such as:

- Making demeaning remarks directly or indirectly such as name-calling, racial slurs or "jokes"; or
- Physically threatening or harming an individual; or
- Displaying demeaning visual or written materials; or
- Defacing, damaging, or destroying property or materials; or
- Performing any other act that is clearly harassing in nature.

Any student, staff, or community member who believes that he or she has been the subject of harassment and/ or discriminatory behavior should report the incident immediately to the principal or department supervisor. Complaints regarding harassment/discriminatory behavior will be investigated immediately.

Any student, staff, or community member who violates this policy will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.
