Dear Girdwood PK-8 Families,

Our days are getting longer, and the snow has been amazing this winter! I hope you have been out enjoying this awesome winter season we have been having! Our kids are gearing up for testing, and our teachers are working hard to ensure they are ready for the spring assessments. We are excited about the progress our students are making in the classrooms and are certain that we will achieve all our goals during testing. As you are making plans for the spring semester, please remember that our 3rd-8th grade students are scheduled to take our state-wide AK STAR assessment in reading and math, and 5th and 8th grade in science March 28th through April 8th. As we know, student attendance is always important. Absences during this time will impact the student as well as the school schedule. Please try to schedule appointments and any absences outside of this time frame.

We are so excited for Girdwood School Ski Days to return this year! A big shout out to Alyeska Resort for their help in making this possible! We held ski days on 2/25 and 3/3 and will have future ski days on 3/18, 3/25, 4/1, and 4/8 weather permitting. The rest of the ski days are on Friday afternoons. Thanks to all the parent volunteers and chaperones who make our ski day program successful! We couldn't do it without you!

The Anchorage School District is partnering with the Association of Alaska School Boards to conduct the School Climate and Connectedness Survey ©, a statewide survey for students, staff, and families. This survey measures perceptions of each school's climate, including the engagement of students, staff, and families. We value and need input from our Girdwood School families. You are an important partner as we work to continually improve our school's environment. We are asking that one parent/guardian complete one survey from now until March 25th. If you have more than one child attending our school, you only need to fill out one survey. The survey should take less than 5 minutes. The survey is available in English, Spanish, Tagalog, Hmong, and Samoan. Families can toggle to their target language in the upper left-hand corner. Thank you for your cooperation in this year's School Climate and Connectedness Survey©.

Library Book Care

- Avoid food or drinks when reading library books.
- Keep library books in a clean and dry location.
- Always transport library books in a bag or backpack.
- Use a bookmark or piece of paper. Large objects break the book spine.
- Place library books in backpacks when finished reading so they make their way back to school on time.
- Return library books to the classroom book drop boxes on or before your scheduled library.
- Encourage reading and re-reading of library books.
- Read with your child. We encourage children to check out any book that brings them joy. Sometimes it is a book a student can read by themselves and sometimes students select books above their reading level and that is ok! It is a chance for you to enjoy them together.
- Also be sure to contact me if you have water damage, pet damage, or lost books. Hundreds of dollars are lost each year due to improper book care and accidents. Please contact me if there is a problem and we can come up with a plan for replacement that works for us all.

Notes from our School Nurse...

Dear Girdwood School Families,

I hope you all have a wonderful spring break, full of what you do to replenish and rejoice. I'm planning for lots of adventures in the snow and hoping for sun! When we return to school, Covid-19 mitigation is planned to continue with masking being optional at school and when riding the bus. Masking is still required after a positive Covid-19 diagnosis if returning to school after a 5-day isolation, on days 6 through 10.

We have a spectrum of feelings within our community about mask mandates being lifted within school. I am hopeful that our mitigation efforts of keeping sick students and staff home as well as an excellent ventilation system will prevent widespread Covid-19 and other illnesses from sweeping through our school.

This means that if your student has any of the following, even one of these symptoms, they must stay home and receive a negative molecular Covid-19 test and have resolving symptoms before returning to school:

- Fever greater than 100.4 F, chills, or feel warm from a presumed fever
- New Cough
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting, diarrhea
- Skin lesions / rash

Testing is available through school, Capstone at the Community Center on Tuesdays and Saturdays, as well as at the Girdwood Health Clinic.

If you plan to have your student be mask free, in certain situations please consider having your student wear a mask. For example, if your student returns to school following an illness with resolving symptoms but still has a little congestion or occasional cough. If your student is a known close contact. Please have your student wear a mask in these situations and others, as you feel appropriate.

If we are all willing to don a mask for these short amounts of time it may prevent others from having to miss school and suffer through an illness. If we all view this targeted mask wearing as a thoughtful, conscientious thing to do for our community we can all transition into this next phase of pandemic management more easily and with less illness.

Below are the basic guidelines for reporting a student's absence:

If your child will not be at school, please call the school office at 742-5300, or email Bethanie **and** Robyn, **before** 10:30 am, to excuse their absence. Please make sure you call the office, even if you have told their teacher.

If you know in advance of a scheduled absence, please call the office and send a note to the classroom teacher ASAP. This will help the teacher to gather schoolwork, if needed. If your child will be gone for more than a couple of days, please fill out the extended absence form. You can get one in the office Tardy students must stop in the office, sign in, and get a late pass, before going to class.

If parents want their child to ride a different bus home or get off at a different bus stop, they must send a note for the bus driver and have it signed by the office.

Dear Parents/Guardians:

During the spring semester we will once again be administering the STAMP assessment to our world language and immersion students in grades 2-12. STAMP (Standards-based Measurement of Proficiency), a product of Avant Assessment, provides district-wide data on how well our students are progressing in their study of a second language. This year the STAMP testing window will be February 22 - March 18, 2022, with make-ups through March 25.

STAMP is a web-based adaptive assessment that is used to determine levels of Novice to Advanced at any point along the learning path, based upon the national ACTFL (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) proficiency levels. STAMP is unique in that it is a nationally-normed assessment that measures the four skills of reading, writing, listening, and speaking that uses real-world questions, scenarios, or prompts that engage students to actively determine their individual proficiency levels in each of the skills. STAMP assesses how well students understand and are able to use the language.

STAMP is a tool used to determine proficiency, not just another standardized test. Students could potentially use their results to help with their placement and/or credit at the college or university level. Results could also be shared with potential employers as proficiency levels are based on national standards. Furthermore, students who are seniors and who meet the criteria will qualify for the Anchorage School District's Seal of Biliteracy. ASD Statement of Nondiscrimination

Board policy 114 Nondiscrimination & Harassment

The Board is committed to an environment of nondiscrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, economic status, union affiliation, disability and other human differences. All students and employees of the Anchorage School District have a right to pursue their education or occupation in compliance with applicable law and policy with dignity in a safe environment. Neither discrimination nor harassment of employees, students or volunteers is permitted in the District. This policy applies with regard to District facilities, premises, vehicles, computers, servers, and electronics located both on and off school property; and conduct on non-school property if the student or employee is at any school-sponsored, school-approved, or school-related activity or is otherwise subject to the authority of the District.

Board policy 114.1 Inappropriate Behavior

The Anchorage School District supports respectful learning and working environments and believes strongly this environment must be structured to reflect diverse cultural traditions and contributions. The District values diversity among students and staff and believes that all students and staff have the right to participate in school activities free from harassment. Behavior by Board members, administrators, employees, parents, volunteers, students, vendors, or others doing business with the District, that ridicules, harasses, intimidates, or threatens students, staff or community members, or otherwise undermines a respectful safe, and effective school environment, is prohibited. Individuals or groups are in violation of this policy if they engage in any of the above behaviors in a way that is disruptive to the work or education environment, such as:

- Making demeaning remarks directly or indirectly such as name-calling, racial slurs or "jokes"; or
- Physically threatening or harming an individual; or
- Displaying demeaning visual or written materials; or
- Defacing, damaging, or destroying property or materials; or
- Performing any other act that is clearly harassing in nature.

Any student, staff, or community member who believes that he or she has been the subject of harassment and/or discriminatory behavior should report the incident immediately to the principal or department supervisor.

Complaints regarding harassment/discriminatory behavior will be investigated immediately. Any student, staff, or community member who violates this policy will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

2022 AK STAR and Alaska Science State Assessment Schedule

Each spring, Alaskan students are provided an opportunity to show what they know. When students show what they know, teachers and parents can partner to promote student success. This year, the State of Alaska Department of Education has partnered with NWEA to align the English language arts and mathematics tests with the MAP Growth benchmark assessments students take in fall, winter and spring. This balanced assessment system will target instruction and better support meeting students' individual learning needs. AK STAR (Alaska System of Academic Readiness) and the Alaska Science Assessment are administered to students in Grades 3-9 (English language arts and mathematics) and grades 5, 8 and 10 (science) each spring. The purpose of a large-scale, summative assessment is to provide parents and schools an overall picture of a student's progress in meeting the Alaska standards at his/her grade level. The assessment is taken on the computer and is not timed, but each content area takes approximately 150-180 minutes. Additionally, an English Learner student who has recently arrived to the country in grades 3-9, will not be taking the ELA portion of AK STAR. Parents can locate resources for the new AK STAR test and the Alaska Science Assessment, including directions for Practice tests and Tutorials on the ASD website at https:// www.asdk12.org/akstar. Parents can also help by ensuring their children are well rested, eat a nutritious breakfast, and are at school on time for the days of testing. Please avoid scheduling appointments on your child's testing days. The ASD AK STAR and Alaska Science Assessment testing window allows for school assessment scheduling flexibility. Students! Get ready to show what you know during our school's AK STAR and Alaska Science Assessment testing dates are March 28th through April 8th.
