## **HIGH SCHOOL 4-YEAR PLANNER\***



When selecting your classes, there is a lot to consider. Use this planner/checklist to keep track of what credits you have earned, and what's still needed for your graduation requirements and learning goals.

- Credits are earned when you pass a course.
- Courses can build on each other. You must earn credit for some courses before you move on to others (i.e. check for prerequisites)
- Detailed course descriptions are in the Polaris Program of Studies on the scheduling website.

- Some courses count as full credit (1) and some as half credit (.5)
- Polaris' graduation requirements are listed on the attached plan. Ask your advisor and/or school counselor for help if you are unsure which courses you need.
- Make room in your plan for electives which can include fine arts, performance, CTE or other courses.
- Use your college and career interests to help you with decisions. Take an interest inventory or research what high school courses will help you with a college path.

- You may be able to earn high school credit in middle school by taking courses like Algebra 1 or a World Language.
   Taking high school courses early can help you get a jump on learning and free up space in your high school schedule. Ask your school counselor if adding these courses to your high school transcript is right for you and how that can affect your overall G.P.A.
- Are you planning to take advanced courses? Advanced Placement (AP) allows you to take college-level courses while in high school. Score well on the exams, and you can earn college credit!
- Ideas for self-directed or alternative learning, such as Independent Study, Challenge Course, Gifted Mentorship, CTE Internship, Independent Capstone, Painting a Mural, or offering a Peer-taugt class can be found in the Polaris Program of Studies. Talk to your advisor, teachers and/or counselor about how to make the most of your opportunities for learning at Polaris.
