October @ Your Library



Curriculum

For October, the genre, or style of writing, of the month is Mystery. A mystery is a made-up story in which a detective finds the answer to a question or solves a crime, using clues. Mysteries usually contain an atmosphere of excitement and suspense and are great for developing critical thinking skills because the reader puts together clues to solve the mystery along with the book character(s).

This month in the library, students at specific grade levels are being supported in meeting English Language Arts and Library / Media Literacy standards in the following areas.

Kindergarten – We will emphasize book handling and care, book selection, library locations, and fiction versus nonfiction. In these activities, we will focus on standards asking students to identify characters, setting, and events; to ask / answer questions about unknown words in fiction and nonfiction; to identify front and back covers and title page; to participate in collaborative conversations; and to recognize question words.

First Grade – We will look at book handling and care; book selection and discussion; author, illustrator, and title; library locations; and parts of a book. Through these activities, we will address standards involving asking / answering questions about key details and identifying main topic, and standards addressing collaborative conversations.

Second Grade – We will conduct book discussions; share good ideas for book handling, care, and selection; review author, illustrator, title, publisher, and copyright; look at elements of a story (characters, plot, setting, etc.); explore library locations; examine parts of a book (emphasizing title page); and compare fiction versus nonfiction. Through these activities, we will focus on standards that focus on students asking / answering questions to demonstrate understanding and clarifying comprehension, and standards focused on collaborative conversations.

Third Grade – Through book discussion; demonstration of effective book handling, care, and selection; review of author, illustrator, title, publisher, and copyright; defining elements of a story; exploring library locations; and examining the parts of a book (emphasizing title page, table of contents, index, and glossary), we will target standards that expect students to be able to ask / answer questions to demonstrate understanding, and to use text features and search tools to locate information.

Fourth Grade – By participating in readers' theater, exploring library locations, and conducting library research, we will address standards that ask students to use details and examples, and to differentiate between situations requiring formal and informal English.

Fifth Grade – By participating in readers' theater, engaging in book discussion, and talking about the research process (brainstorming topics, using a variety of sources, and synthesis), we will focus on standards requiring that students quote accurately from text when explaining explicit answers and inferences; requiring that students be able to determine main ideas; and requiring that students adapt speech to various contexts.

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Sixth Grade – By participating in readers' theater, engaging in book discussion, participating in the research process (brainstorming topics, using a variety of sources, and synthesis), and investigating the topics of intellectual property and digital literacy, we will address a number of standards. We will compare / contrast the experience of listening versus reading. We will determine an author's point of view or purpose. We will conduct mini-research projects. We will engage in collaborative discussions. Finally, we will continue a series of Online Safety / Responsibility lessons begun in previous years.

Activities

Library Class of the Month

All students will continue to compete to win the Library Class of the Month award. Winning classes will be announced during Quarterly Assemblies. Please plan to attend Quarterly Assemblies where you can celebrate all our students' achievements!

Recess Read-Aloud / Young Readers' Choice

4th and 5th grade students will be invited to attend Recess Read-Aloud sessions, in conjunction with the Young Readers' Choice program. These programs encourage recreational reading, book discussion, and student voting on which book they consider the best written during the year. These programs are a great way to encourage students to read and think critically. Please look for a permission slip for these programs soon.

Maker Space

2nd through 6th grade students will be invited to visit the library once a week during recess to create, explore, collaborate, and learn using a variety of materials ranging from Lego blocks to cardboard tubes, straws, paper plates, tissue paper, and the like. No permission slip is required.

Title 1 Parent Update

September 24, 2021

Dear Parent:

Under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), the parents of students attending Title I schools have the right to request the professional qualifications of their children's teachers. I can assure you that all teachers in the Anchorage School District meet strict state standards and are indeed qualified to teach, but you have the right also to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development has issued an Alaska teacher's certificate for the grade(s) and subject(s) he or she teaches.
- Whether the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development has decided that your child's teacher can teach without being certified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
- Whether the teacher is teaching in the field of discipline of the certification of the teacher.
- Whether any classroom aides or other paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

If you would like specific information about your child's teacher or paraprofessional, please contact me. For general information about ESEA, please contact Zareena Clendaniel, Compliance Coordinator, for the school district, at 742-7819.
